What's the difference between a fiddle and a violin?

The short answer: None, usually, but sometimes strings. The long answer: Violins and fiddles are essentially the same instrument, but the style of music is very different. Violinists often play complex written music at a slower tempo. Fiddlers play fast, often improvise and may use simpler tunes to accommodate their speed. Sometimes fiddlers will trade in traditional synthetic strings for steel strings to sharpen the twangy bluegrass style.

"This Month In History" JUNE

1789: James Madison proposes the Bill of Rights, leading to the Constitution's first 10 amendments.

1865: Union General Granger reaches Galveston, Texas, one of the last holdouts of slavery, and enforces the Emancipation Proclamation for enslaved people there.

1919: The Treaty of Versailles is signed in France, signaling the official end of World War I.

1947: Pilot Kenneth Arnold reports flashes of light and nine incredibly speedy "saucer-like" UFOs whizzing over Mount Rainier, Wash., leading to the common term "flying saucers."

1956: President Eisenhower signs a bill funding interstate highway building, making it the largest American public works program.

1960: Alfred Hitchcock's infamous "Psycho" hits movie theaters and makes moviegoers fear showers for generations to come.

1975: Broadway hit "Chicago" premieres, going on to earn 10 nominations at the 1976 Tony Awards. The 2002 film won six Academy Awards, including Best Picture.

1978: Garfield, Jim Davis' classic comic feline, makes his national debut.

1980: CNN, the first 24-hour news service, starts airing June 1.

1997: J.K. Rowling publishes the first book in her bestselling series "Harry Potter."

2002: "American Idol" premieres on Fox, featuring first winner Kelly Clarkson.
